Our charter flight to the Rupununi landed at the airstrip next to Kaieteur Falls. From this viewpoint, we admired the Potaro River waters dropping massively while vocal swifts swirled in the mist and gained elevation to gather in huge thermals. Contiguous to the falls, magnificent, enormous bromeliads were home to the diminutive and gorgeous Golden Tree Frog. Equally fascinating, the forest provided views of the bizarre and astonishing Guianan Cock-of-the-rock. Welcome to Guyana!

Upon landing at Rock View Village, we started a journey that would give us the opportunity and the privilege to visit various locations of the northern and southern Rupununi, a vast grassland located in southern Guyana. A stop in a patch of riverine forest allowed us to enjoy views of a pair of Black-crested Antshrikes, a subspecies that is so well-ornated! Later, we made stops at ponds along the road, which provided our first views of Jabiru (Stork), Cocoi Heron, Aplomado Falcon, and Pearl Kite. After an afternoon packed with views of grassland and wetland birds, we arrived for dinner at Manari Lodge and got ready for our next full day in Karasabai, a Makushi village that hosts one of the most wonderful birds of the Neotropics, the Sun Parakeet. The survival of this parakeet in Guyana is due to the efforts of a Makushi community: Karasabai. Once widespread in the forested foothills of the Southern Pacaraima Mountains, it faced intensive hunting because of its beautiful plumage. Today, only pockets of its original distribution remain in Guyana and northern Brazil.

With hopes to see this spectacular parakeet, we left Manari Lodge before dawn and enjoyed a breakfast in the field, serenaded by Purple Gallinules and Red-breasted Meadowlarks while egrets, herons, and a White-tailed Hawk performed well for us. Upon meeting Uncle Ali, we started our search. As we explored the forested slopes, we added Northern Mouse-colored Tyrannulet (this split was uploaded on the eBird database literally this day!), Pale-tipped Tyrannulet, Pale-eyed Pygmy-Tyrant, and Tropical Gnatcatcher to our checklist. There was a

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Rufous-browed Peppershrike singing constantly, a Chivi Vireo exploring the leaf litter in the *Curatella*, and a Yellow Oriole showing us its wonderful yellow plumage. By midmorning we had enjoyed a wealth of birds, but no Sun Parakeet had been reported.

As the day warmed up, we explored other areas along the road and were soon given a gift when six Sun Parakeets were observed flying over our heads. What a wonderful moment! We celebrated the privilege to see one of the rarest and most difficult-to-see Psittacids in the world but were determined to find them perched. We walked stretches of the road, checked fruiting trees, and listened intently in search of the parakeets. We walked the same road two and even three times without luck. But, as the old saying goes, *good luck is about trying continuously*. Returning down the hill, we were about to give up. It was getting too hot. But Uncle Ali asked us to stop for a last check in a tree where he had seen the parakeets recently. He went into a trail and returned running. He had found them! We assembled and walked in quietly, and there they were, five wonderful individuals preening, calling, and doing what they do best: enjoying freedom in their natural habitat. I cannot describe the feeling of happiness and completeness when seeing a threatened species flying in freedom. We celebrated the finding of the parakeet with a lunch in the community and rounded-up a wonderful day with exploration in a wetland, where we nailed a little-known bird species, the Crested Doradito.

After a great deal of exploration and birding in the Northern Rupununi, we started our drive to the wildest part of Guyana, the Southern Rupununi. We took the dirt road around the wonderful Kanuku Mountains and headed south. The landscape was simply breathtaking.

We drove across stands of Moriche Palms and extensive *Curatella* scrub, plus savannas, gallery forest, and endless grasslands. At scattered ponds we enjoyed views of Masked Duck and Black-bellied Whistling-Duck. At every stop we were fascinated with the scenery and the wonderful mountains in the background. Eventually, we made it into a Rupununi shangri-la, the Wichabai Ranch. After a delicious meal we explored the patch of secondary growth edging the forest, getting cool views of some tyrant-flycatchers, the resident Chivi Vireo, and the vocal Flavescent Warbler (a resident species).

The power of nature was experienced in the heat, the humidity, the beauty, and a heavy and thunderous storm that cleared the skies for an impressive night, accompanied by a Tropical Screech-Owl singing, a White-tailed Nightjar foraging, and the whole Milky Way illuminating the ceiling over our heads. It was simply magical.

The South Rupununi has been somehow neglected by the birding community until recently, when a Smithsonian Institute team discovered a colony of Red Siskins there. Dr. Mike Braun played a key role in the discovery and also built community awareness around this wonderful species. Nowadays, there is an incredible corp of volunteer rangers who protect this species and its habitats under the leadership of the South Rupununi Conservation Society (SRCS). For that,

we owe a big thank you to the Guyanese leaders who have put together creativity and effort to deal with the challenges and limitations to protecting wildlife with limited resources and under rough conditions.



The SRCS team took us birding to several areas, and the key one was an exploration of the slopes of the Kanuku Mountains. Here, again, we fell in love with the landscape and walked among savannas and grasslands to arrive at a location where they have been tracking Red Siskins—and we got them! Seeing this species that almost went extinct was not only a privilege but allowed us to learn about the challenges facing its protection.

Heading back to Lethem to spend a full day near the border of Brazil was not a farewell to the South Rupununi but a commitment that we are now ambassadors in communicating the tremendous effort that everyone there is putting forth to

preserve the siskin, Giant Anteater, River Turtles, and much more.

A final morning of birding in the gallery forest of the Ireng River helped us to understand bird distribution in these vast savannas and, apart of the amazing views of Hoary-throated Spinetail, Mato Grosso Antbird, and Rufous-tailed Jacamar (restricted distribution here), we also nailed the diminutive and cute Bearded Tachuri, Grassland Yellow-Finch, White-throated Kingbird, Pectoral Sandpiper (a boreal migrant!), and Grassland Sparrow. In closing the morning, and before the drive back to Lethem for the flight back to Georgetown, I stood on top of a hill, looked around (rotating 360 degrees), and took a last breath of this land that challenges me as a leader and also made me fall in love with it. Until the next year, Rupununi!
